Pastor's Pondering ~ April 2015

"Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here. He is Risen!" (Luke 24:5)

I left the rescheduled Annual Meeting on March 4 with mixed feelings. Snowed out on January 26, weighed down with what felt like endless winter, on March 4th we were three weeks into Lent, a time traditionally dedicated to inner reflection, penitence, and searching for transformation through deepening our relationship with Jesus Christ. For many people, Lent is the spiritual low point of the year and Easter, the ultimate high point. Everything in between ebbs and flows sometimes like a roller coaster ride, or like wandering between dessert and oasis. So I sat for a long time the next morning thinking about what I'd heard the night before: enthusiastic observations about new growth, sincere concerns about our finances, frustration over having to contemplate reducing the Pastor's hours and compensation, questions about our restricted and unrestricted funds.

On March 5th, anticipating Easter joy, I wondered, "Where is the life of our church centered – in deep pockets and bank accounts? In refurbished rooms? In activities and events? In mission projects and giving? In committee meetings and ad hoc groups? In worship, music, prayer, and Bible study? In Jesus Christ?"

I am a list maker so I began to write, line after line, everything that goes on in our church and in town because of our church. All of these things were covered in our narrative spiritual budget. When I paused, though, the angel's words from Luke came into my head as if from the tomb on that first Easter morning. "Why do you look for the living among the dead? Christ is not here... Not in the disembodied items on your list. Ask yourself what's missing from that list, and start again."

Ah, an Easter message. Start again. Isn't that what life is about on any given day? We get up each

morning with the possibility of beginning anew. Routines notwithstanding, each day offers something different from the day before. We can choose to be resurrected, or walk away from the tomb unmoved.

What was missing from my list? People! Names of the real people who make up our beloved community!

I had all sorts of activities, but there was no life in them staring back at me from the paper. It's the people who bring to life our worship, committee meetings and activities. It's the members of our congregation with all their varied interests, talents, and favorite projects. It's the people who argue and disagree and then step back to reflect on what the other has said. It's the people who forgive each other and reach out in understanding that none of us is perfect; it's the people who greet each other Sunday morning or can't wait to share news when gathering in the kitchen; it's people who hold each other's babies or help an older member get safely down stairs.

When we are like the women on Easter morning, trudging to the tomb to perform their mournful duty, more focused on the task than on the goal, we are ready to embalm when life remains! I once heard a preacher say that the disciples seemed almost disappointed that the tomb was empty It wasn't what they expected;

it did not conform to the plans they had undoubtedly made behind closed doors in the hours after Jesus' crucifixion. The world tells us that death means "over and done." So the disciples were confused and not sure how to proceed when they heard that Jesus was alive. Suddenly, Jesus was there among them. The women had not brought an idle tale born of their emotional wishful thinking!

Jesus was – and IS – alive and that was missing from my list and from our deliberations. Recognition of Jesus in our midst, God with us, encouraging us to look for life instead of resignedly accepting death.

The phone rang and a member shared some ideas about fundraising. The phone rang again; more reflection about the meeting and how we need to pray for one another, to ask the Holy Spirit to come into our beloved church home and into the homes of all our members and friends with a message of hope rather than defeat.

It's true, some will say, "That's just a lot of religious idealism. It won't pay the bills." Others will say, "What's the point of hanging onto money for a rainy day when it's pouring now?" And still others will say, "Money is a tool for mission and ministry. Use it for the good of others not just for ourselves."

So I ask you as we enter this Easter season, what will new life in our church look like to you? Have you already caught glimpses of it? Will you be like Mary who ran excitedly back to tell the disciples that she had seen Jesus alive and on his way to them? Will you help spread the good news about our church?

What an awful shock Jesus would have had if he arrived where he expected disciples and found an empty room, deserted by disciples who chose to look for death when they could have seen life if only they had waited just a bit longer remembering that

those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint. (Isaiah 40:27-31)

On March 21st, Arthur and I attended MACUCC Super Saturday in Ludlow. During the morning worship with 500 other people, I had an epiphany (yes, that's the season before Lent – it changes us from the outside in, while Lent seeks to change us from the inside out – all works together so that we can celebrate the joy of Easter!) The epiphany came as the worship leader asked us to cup our hands and imagine them filled to the brim, to the point that the contents were about to spill out; so full that if our hands were bumped, whatever we held would spill over the edges. The speaker suggested that at that moment we could choose whether whatever filled our hands could be spilled out from abundance, goodness and generosity to be shared, or that the fullness was just too much accumulated mental or material stuff that we need to release. Either way, he said, the emptying is what's important because that makes more room for God's amazing giving to come into our empty places.

That angel voice whispered to me again, "That's the message of the empty tomb: God has an amazing way of giving us all that we need, when we need it, without our having to force our will on others; without having to rely on worldly solutions when something much more satisfying awaits."

So what was missing from Annual Meeting? A process involving people willing to share hopes and dreams for our church and the means to support our ministries. The solution we seek for our future doesn't lie in "either/or," but in seeing life where there seems to be death. A process may now emerge from the informational meetings scheduled by the Church Committee. I encourage you to attend at least one of them trusting that, just as Jesus showed up at the right moment and turned Mary's despair into rejoicing, he's likely to do that for us if we let him.

As Easter dawns, I urge members and friends to trust that our church is about to experience Resurrection because every day, we are finding new ways to serve in the name of our Risen Savior!
