~Pastor's Pondering~~

Do unto others as you would have them do to you. ~ Luke 6:31

The theme of Children's Day, May 31, is based on "The Golden Rule." Coming at the end of a month filled with happy activity, I feel blessed to have participated this month in celebrations, times of worship, and fund-raising meetings, attended plays, concerts, and annual dinners. I've also been present during sober and sad events. Whether at breakfast on Confirmation Sunday or at the Spring Fling dance, preparing to baptize children or for funerals, attending the Memorial Day Assembly at the high school or offering prayers on Memorial Day, or representing our church at the Central Association Annual Meeting, I've observed people tending to others in ways that truly fulfill Jesus' commandment to love one another, that reveal the best in our human nature.

There's been barely time to reflect on these various events, however, with summer nearly here, I'd like to ponder a bit about all that has transpired during the first year of The Quabbin Drug Response Unifying Group, QDRUG, a ministry affirmed by our Diaconate and Missions Committees as well as by members and friends of our church who believe that "together, we can stand up against drug abuse."

After the deaths of four young Barre residents in 2014, I asked our Deacons what role our church, any church, ought to take in response to such tragic loss of life. I wrote about their response in my May 2014 Ponderings. The Deacons expressed heartfelt compassion and suggested we start some form of outreach to the wider community, maybe in the form of informational programs; they encouraged me to preach regularly about making healthy choices lifting up alternatives to using drugs or alcohol either for coping or for recreation. They gave me their full support to reach out to others in town and to become involved in a ministry that has evolved into a network of committed citizens who are trying to help individuals and families combat the effects of substance addiction while trying to prevent the spread of this scourge.

Last June, Kathlyn Inman, Fr. Jamie from the St. Francis of Assisi Parish, Deacon Bill Ferrarone, and I met to discuss what area churches might do to address the drug epidemic. We asked each other what sort of response people of faith ought to have when lives are being lost or ruined by alcohol, prescription drugs, opiates, and substances never intended for human consumption.

Each of us believe that because God is good, life is good, and that God has given each of us a precious gift that we are invited to unwrap over the course of a lifetime in order to discover all that God wants us to experience. We shared our dismay that young people's lives were being cut short as a result of poor or uninformed choices.

We wanted to help parents, grandparents, relatives, neighbors, teachers and administrators, coaches and activity volunteers gain a fuller understanding of the problems associated with addiction so we asked ourselves what area churches could do to encourage young people to make life-affirming choices rather than ones that would permanently alter the course of their lives.

Chief Erik Demetropoulis, QRHS Principal Ray Dewar and Assistant Principal Greg Devine, and Susan Collette helped establish the direction of QDRUG. Word spread and other police personnel, doctors and administrators from the Barre Family Health Center, program providers from the Listening Center, Senior Center Director Lester Paquin and Nekr Jenkins from the Quabbin Youth Initiative joined us, and over the course of this first year, other school, health and law enforcement professionals (several from neighboring towns) became involved as have people in recovery who don't want others to go through the misery they've overcome.

When we posted a questionnaire on-line last July, we were able to assess people's awareness and the pervasiveness of the drug problem in Barre and the Quabbin area. We had over 500 responses that included more than 400 written comments that are still helping us make plans especially for youth who are looking for healthy, organized activities to keep them safe!

We held our first "Community Meeting" at the Senior Center last November and despite weather challenges last winter, have met every month since! <u>Community Meetings are now scheduled for the second Wednesday of every month starting at 6:30 and ending by 8:30.</u> The purpose of these gatherings is to talk with others who share our concerns and our belief that together, we can stem the tide of addiction and bring hope to those who are in recovery. Our primary goals are to provide information about drug abuse, to minimize the stigma and shame associated with drug or alcohol addiction, to support local law enforcement, and to be compassionate companions for those in recovery or whose loved ones have died as a result of drug use. We are currently working on a mission statement that, from my perspective, is based on "the Golden Rule" because we commit ourselves to building healthy communities by providing hope, education, support and understanding.

This is only the beginning. I am amazed and gratified by the growth of this ministry in such a short amount of time and pleased by the number of people from or affiliated with our church that are involved. I hope your summer plans include coming to Community Meetings (held on the second Wednesday beginning at 6:30 PM at the Senior Center) or by attending QDRUG programs that are announced on our FaceBook page, in the Barre Gazette, often on the Town solar sign, on the Town website, and in church bulletins.

June will bring many more happy events to church members and friends celebrating milestone birthdays, graduations, retirements, and family gatherings. May these times together be blessed by God's love and our commitment to take care of each other as our Lord asks us to do.

"Then God said to me, 'Prophesy to these bones, and say to them: O dry bones, hear the word of the Lord. Thus says the Lord God to these bones: I will cause breath to enter you, and you shall live." - Ezekiel 37:4-5

I was once asked why I wanted to get ordained since the church was dying. That was forty years ago. Two years ago my daughter was ordained, and someone asked *her* how she was going to deal with being a leader in a dying church. She answered, "I don't believe that God will let the church die."

I don't either, because our God specializes in breathing life back into what seems lifeless, creating possibilities where there seem to be none.

I recall the wonder I felt when I learned that the words for spirit, wind, and breath are all the same word in the Bible. It turns up everywhere. It's the wind that blew over the formless void at creation. It's the breath that reanimated the dry bones in Ezekiel's vision. It's the Spirit that overcame the disciples at Pentecost and created the church.

The church is not dead and we're not done, not by a long shot. Sure, things are changing and the future won't look like today. But God's wind is still blowing. God's breath is still breathing. God's Spirit is still empowering. "I will cause breath to enter you, and you shall live!"


