Good Soil

But as for what was sown on good soil, this is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields, in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty.' Matthew 13:23

It was just about three and the kindergartners at the girls' school where I teach lined up behind their teachers. Then they marched, backpacks bouncing to the gate to meet their parents. Each little girl held a paper cup in her hands and each cup held soil and a bean plant about five inches tall. The leafy green stalks waved in the afternoon breeze. I smiled, recalling the year my younger son had sprouted beans in paper cups to fulfill a science project about plant growth. After carefully tending his seeds for weeks, nurturing them with a variety of ingredients, he produced a little bean plantation with specimens of various heights and vigor. That is, until the morning the project was due. We rose that day to discover sixteen paper cups, each containing a stubby, leafless green stalk, Ebony, our big black cat, sat purring on the floor, surrounded by tattered bean leaves. Fortunately, our son had some graphs, photos, and an understanding teacher, so all was not lost. But it made me think about growing things-and about faith.

When Jesus taught His disciples using the parable of the sower, He used an object familiar in their agrarian society, Every body knew about seeds. People planted them, watered them, cultivated them, and then waited for them to grow. Jesus said that God's Work is a lot like seed. It falls upon the soil of our hearts and, and depending upon the condition of that soil, it takes root and upon the condition of that soil, it takes root and grows. Sometimes the soil is hard and unyielding and then the seed is eaten by birds. Other times the soil nurtures the seed for a little while, and then because the soil is shallow or full of weeds, the sprouted seed withers and dies. But then Jesus talked about good soil, soil that yields many time more than what was planted. This soil produces healthy, abundant plants.

I looked again at the kindergarteners with their paper cups. They held their little plants carefully. For weeks they had tenderly watered their seeds, set them in the sunshine, protected them from pests; and, now, their little bean seeds had produced leafy, green shoots.

What an illustration of Jesus' parable!

When we hear the good seed of God's Word through our own Bible study, or the teaching of another, we each have a choice. Will it fall upon hard heart-soil, sucked dry by the concerns of today, cracked and dusty from fretting about tomorrow? Will it lie there untended, waiting to be stolen by the birds of disbelief? Will it spring up quickly, fueled by early enthusiasm, only to wither when we become overwhelmed with problems or worries? Or will this newly planted seed of faith fall on receptive soil, softened by humilty, watered with the encouragement of prayer, exposed to the light of study and meditation, protected from the pests of doubt and worry? If we choose to keep our heart-soil soft, tender, and well nourished, Jesus says we can expect to produce even more faith. That little seed of hope will grow.

And the wonder of it all is that it doesn't just remain alone, but produces an abundance that can be shared with others; the hundred, sixty, or thirty times Jesus spoke about. When our faith grows, we have enough to give to others, we can offer a word of encouragement or comfort. We can reach out with generosity and grace, lifting someone else's spirits, building faith, We can overflow with the blessings of our own harvest and, in thanks, nourish our families, friends, and even strangers, Those seeds of faith are important, but they need to be planted in the willing soil of our hearts before we can enjoy the blessing of God's bounty.

Dear Lord of seed and soil, help me to prepare my heart so that Your Word may always find a place to grow and multiply there. Amen.
