I followed the road uphill, around corners, over frost heaves and ruts and gouged macadam, to take the long way, the really long way to church via Farrington Road to the Williamsville Road up School Street. And because the road is challenging to drive, I kept both eyes on the road and both hands on the steering wheel! It was a blessing and I made myself let go of the distractions to focus my mind on Christ who indeed gives me life.

Distracted living separates us not only from those we love but also from our best selves and from God. I can personally attest to how easy it is to be so lost in my own pre-occupations that I convey the impression that I don't care about anyone else or that life is all about me. Thus the holidays can be a time of sadness and broken relationships because accumulated hurt feelings lead to misunderstandings and alienation.

Having shaken myself up that morning, I realized how distracted I'd become in my living that wasn't feeling much like living at all, more like existing to rush from pillar to post. God wants so much more for us. The abundance of blessings are overwhelming when we are intentional about noticing the wondrous details of life that take time TO notice, like the giving to you and your loved ones! ones enumerated in the poems above. Or perhaps you'll take a few moments to let God know how much love and gratitude you feel for the blessings you've received in everyday living.

I did. Here's my Thanksgiving prayer written just before sunset as I stood on the deck of our little house that looks out over what used to be cow pastures and when the wind is right, where I can hear the bells of St. Joseph's Chapel.

I am so grateful, God, for the blessings you have sent into my life all through this day – people, calming thoughts, music, all forms of communication that remind me how connected I am to you through other people and all the experiences we share.

Though the sun is setting here, I know it is rising on the other side of our beloved home planet, and I know you have already ordained blessings to be upon others there who lift up their voices to you. The darkness of night brings its own blessings, Holy Provider, so thank you for the comfort of furnishings, electricity, food and scented candles; for twinkling stars and car headlights, for the security I feel knowing that emergency personnel and peace keepers the world over are on duty, for clean bedding and pillows that conform to my sleep style. I like thinking that you smile with me and at me, gracious

sustaining Friend and Companion, because I'm serious when I say thank you for the myriad little luxuries that I dare not take for granted. So I pray for all who do not have a safe place to live or sleep or enough food or enough love to get them through the night. Inspire me to share from my abundance of blessings, day and night, to help someone know that vou have a home in your heart for them. Thank you for all the ways you continue to bless our church and the family of Christ around the world. We need your strength for the days ahead and when darkness feels like it's overtaking the light, call me away from distracted living so that I can see my way into a new day by the Light of Christ. # Special Meetings ~ Summary of the 10/26/2015 Meeting and Notice of the 11/15/2015 Meeting From Pastor Deborah

Forty three church members, the Rev. Kelly Gallagher MACUCC Associate Conference Minister for the Central Association, the Rev. Jonathan New, and BCCUCC Treasurer Bonni Holmes attended the special meeting on October 26 called by the Church Committee for the purpose of reviewing the church finances and hearing the results of an audit of the endowed funds.

Moderator Sue Musnicki asked Rev. Jonathan New, MA Conference UCC Associate Conference Minister for Stewardship and Financial Development to offer the opening prayer. She then outlined the agenda and behavioral expectations for the conduct of the meeting. The agenda listed the following items:

Presentation of the audit of restricted/unrestricted funds by Sarah Dyer

Presentation of the 2016 proposed church budget by members of the Church Committee

Discussion of duties of full time vs. part time minister

There were many questions and comments, observations and expressions of appreciation for the efforts of the Church Committee for trying to find ways to meet financial obligations with declining income. Bonni Holmes and Church Committee Chairperson Jack Lathrop reported that significant savings have been realized over the course of this year but that the budget is as lean as it can go. Jack stated that going forward, all funds need to be viewed as restricted because we are very nearly out of savings (unrestricted funds).

The budget discussion and that related to full-time vs. part-time ministry blended together. Shirley Lewis, Council Chairperson, invited several people to form an ad hoc committee to meet with her during the daytime to explore a possible job description for a part-time minister. Shirley scheduled 3 informational meetings after church on October 4, 11, and 18 but was unable to attend the last one so only two meetings were held.

During Monday's meeting, several handouts were circulated, one showing a possible list of part-time duties for a minister compared to full-time. Kelly Gallagher emphasized the need for a transition committee to work with the minister to do more work on the job description. Ideally a transition committee is selected in much the same way as a search committee. A broad range of people from the congregation need to give input to a new job description to ensure that priorities and expectations are clear. She noted that our need to pare down the budget now puts us in the position of having to put the cart before the horse because we ought to determine what is the church's vision in order to know what the pastor's duties are to be and how much time needs to be allocated for those tasks. Ordinarily, the MA Conference recommends the process take 12 to 18 months to avoid ongoing conflict or misunderstanding.

Thus questions remain about the best ways our church can respond to God's call to do ministry in this time and place. Do we have a clear sense of what our mission and ministry is? Do we know what we expect from ordained clergy? Do we know what we can reasonably the congregation to do that ministers have done in the past? How can the needs of the community be met and by whom if the full time minister's position is reduced from 40-48 hours to 20 or fewer hours? Who will set the priorities for the minister – Diaconate, Church Committee, PPRC, the congregation, a personnel committee? Are there ways to raise funds that have yet to be explored? Are there ways of structuring the church year to accommodate reduced hours and staffing? When will we be able to start working with the consultant we voted to engage at the September 27 special meeting when those present voted to accept the recommendations of the Central Association's situational support inquiry findings? How will we pay that person's fees? How can we pay to have a full audit of the endowed funds so that everyone can understand donor's original intent for money contributed in the past and what monies are available for general operating use?

In addition to the part/full-time worksheet, the other handouts were the agenda, a Template of History of Endowment Funds that Sarah put together; and the proposed budget for 2016 reducing the pastor's

compensation from a total of \$64,000 to \$32,000 and projecting an operating total of \$105,000. Other categories remained unchanged except for postage. In 2014, the Church Committee allocated \$4,000 to purchase forever stamps, then only 46 cents.

Clerk pro tem for the meeting was Lisa Harris Fogarty who has complete notes of the proceedings. Kelly, Jonathan, and the Church Committee urged members to contact them and ask questions, get information, and become actively involved in the decision making for our church. Kelly and Jonathan may be contacted at the MACUCC Conference Office in Framingham at 508-875-5233; members of the Church Committee are Jack Lathrop, Sarah Dyer, Bob Swindell, Steve Morrall, Shirley Lewis, Ann Clark, Adam Knipe, and Lisa Holloway. Those who contributed to the work of the ad hoc committee include Sarah Dyer, Laura Friedman, Lois Cooley, Bob Swindell, Lisa Holloway, and Kathy Fritcher.

Another special meeting will be held after church on Sunday, November 15 to vote on the proposed 2016 budget. Every member is strongly encouraged to review both the proposed budget and the part-time job description and to attend the meeting.

We are at a crossroads in the history of the Barre Congregational Church when we have to ask whether money concerns are going to determine our future or is God's call to ministry going to guide us in new directions of service to Jesus Christ?
