Real Good Church: How Our Church Came Back from the Dead, and Yours Can, Too

If you were in church during September, you could see for yourself that our church is alive and building! We are God's beloved community under construction, literally and spiritually. The literal part is temporary. Although there are many projects that need our attention in the near future, construction projects take place within specific time periods. What a great feeling of accomplishment we can feel now that new windows have been installed, there's a new vent hood in the kitchen, and the Ladies Parlor project is nearing completion. We have much to celebrate and appreciate because our Church Committee has put in overtime since June to get these projects done! There will be a dedication of the Ladies Parlor early in the New Year and a blessing of the windows during our worship service on October 26. Be sure to express you thanks to Shirley Lewis, Bob Swindell, Steve Morrall, and Church Committee Chairperson Jack Lathrop.

Building God's beloved community is ongoing, though, from generation to generation, until God's Kingdom has come on earth as it is in heaven.

So we have work to do. Always have; always will if we listen to discern what God is calling us to do next. And that's really good news because when churches are working together to build God's be-

loved community, they feel alive! They are energized! They feel a commitment to the present and sense possibilities for the future. They can feel proud to continue the legacy of those who loved this church and kept on building in their day.

God's Kingdom is always under construction.

If you were in church on Homecoming Sunday, you saw many of us wearing "hard hats," work boots and gloves, construction garb of all sorts, and work aprons. You maneuvered around the "caution tape" and even sat in different seats. The children "built a church" with blocks and on the top of it, they placed a cross. When they realized there was no door, they decided to re-arrange the cross so that it was in the middle of the structure. Then they planned where the doors would go.

"You can't have a church without doors," one of our cherubs boldly stated.

What amazed the adults (who were busy with their own project) was how easily the children decided on a simple plan together, and then shared equally in the building process. They even started making plans for future improvements before the pretend mortar was dry!

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The children have their own hard hats that stay here at church because they know we still have work to do.

The "project" the adults worked on for the first two Sundays is a kind of survey. I handed out 3x5 cards and asked those present to answer a question while they children were building their church.

The first week, I asked, "What does it take to build a church?" Here are some of the answers.

"1. Eyes on God. 2. A firm foundation built on the Word of God. 3. Fruit of the Spirit – love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control. 4. Ears to listen."

"Faith, love, trust, hope, forgiveness. Willingness to change and grow together. Patience with people and with change."

"Faith, love, hard work (labor), cooperation, prayers. A congregation of goal oriented tasks. Keeping our house of God updated. Volunteering. Maintain our historical house of worship. Money."

"People with faith. Sacrifices."

"A group of people who love God and wish to make a difference wherever they are."

The second week I asked, "What is a church?" Here are a few answers.

"A place to worship, to celebrate family, friends, community, and God, and to learn how to be a better person guided by the voice of God."

"A church is a place where people can go in the community to worship God."

"To build a successful church it takes <u>open</u>, <u>honest</u> communication and trust between all parts of the church congregation so they will successfully grow with God's guidance and to God's glory."

"A community of people, many ages, colors, ethnicities and socio-economic backgrounds that join together with faith and love. The church community joins to praise God, learn from Jesus, and work together to create a blessed world."

You'll find all the cards on trifold display boards on October 5, World Communion Sunday when our Stewardship Season begins. All the answers are significant and reveal the depth of commitment and sincerity within our worshipping community that is heartwarming.

The question I'll be asking on October 5 is: **How has our beloved community blessed your life?** And I'd like everyone to wear an apron to church.

October 5 is World Communion Sunday when we will begin our Stewardship season. Friends, neighbors, and folks we haven't seen for a while have asked about "all the construction taking place" at 30 Park Street. As we continue to build our beloved community, people from all over town are sharing stories about our church's proud past, about individual lives, the contributions of our forebears, and what a positive effect our ministries are having today.

This year, the Stewardship Committee is developing a "narrative budget," a planning tool that looks at how our money has made a difference in the lives of our members and in the wider community. Narrative budgets are designed to tell the stories about the ministries your financial contributions make possible, and how we might continue to expand those ministries and others with additional contributions.

Historically, aprons are a symbol of servant-hood or stewardship. Jesus frequently uses the image of stewards. A Chief Steward in a master's house was responsible for maintaining or upgrading the master's property or wealth. All servants wore a tunic style garment that was the equivalent of an apron. We know that aprons protect us, serve as a towel when our hands get

get dirty or wet, and so forth. Aprons identify the wearer as someone actively involved in a project.

Aprons tell stories and that is the foundation of our budget-planning process: a narrative budget that helps all of us become more aware of the many facets of ministry supported by our time, talent, and money.

As a sign of our many ministries, the talents we bring to do them, and your willingness to be a visible part of our church's ever-growing ministry, please think about an apron that is appropriate for you. It might be a cook's or bbq chef's apron, a carpentry apron or work belt, a blacksmith's apron, a painter's smock, or maid's apron – use your imagination and wear it proudly to tell your story about being a faithful steward in our church. This theme will unfold from week to week through the month of October and we'll celebrate the ways our beloved community is growing at our annual Stewardship Brunch on November 2.

A colleague said she likes the idea of wearing hard hats in church because it reminds us of how awesome God is when the beloved community shows it is ready to do God's work in the world. "Better to wear a hard <u>hat</u> than to have a hard head or hard heart," she said.

"That's not a problem for us." I replied. "We're always growing in our willingness to serve Jesus Christ."

Come help us build the beloved community! Come grow with us! Bring your friends ~ we still have plenty of hard hats, warm hearts, and work to do together!


